Renner Volunteers Make a Difference EVERY Day!

Your opportunity to participate and be involved at your child's school begins by volunteering at Schedule and Packet Pick-up (Registration). Your help is needed on Thursday, August 12th and Friday, August 13th.

We need volunteers in many areas from spirit wear, yard signs, volunteer table, to handing out schedules and lunch codes. We will also need 8th graders to give tours to the 6th graders during their registration time. If you wish, you may work the shift of your child's grade level. During this time you can register your own child, catch up with old friends and meet new friends.

Please contact Susie Learmont at volunteers@rennerpta.org to sign up. Your presence will contribute to a wonderful experience for all.

If you are unable to help during registration, don't worry. There are many volunteer areas available throughout the school year. You will have an opportunity to sign up for one of them at registration.

To volunteer at Renner, a Volunteer Agreement and Criminal History Check are required. The Volunteer Agreement will be available at registration. **If you have already registered once online for the Criminal History Check, you may update your information for the coming year on or after July 1. These forms are mandatory for all Renner volunteers. You are encouraged to complete the online process early so you are cleared and eligible to volunteer the first week of the new school year.**

Your service to Renner Middle School is one of the best gifts you can give your child. I look forward to meeting and working with all of you in creating a successful 2010-2011 year for our children, teachers, school staff, and ourselves.

Missing Registration?

Are you going to be out of town during registration? There are two things you can do:

1. Have a friend pick up the schedule for you. You must write a note authorizing them to pick it up for you. **MAKE SURE** you give them your emergency form to turn in.

OR

2. When you get back in town, go to the counselor's office and pick up your schedule. This can only be done **AFTER** registration is over, not before. You must bring your emergency form and turn it in order to get your schedules.

School supplies will be for sale on the first day of school for those who missed registration.

Where is My Emergency Form?

Your emergency form will be mailed to you later this summer. You must bring this form with you to turn in at registration. If you forget it or never got one, you can get a copy of it in the office during registration.

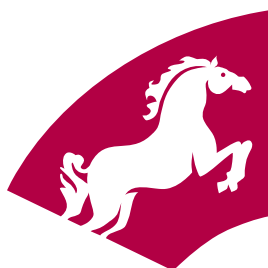

Language Arts Ideas for the Summer:

Please encourage your child to **read silently** for pleasure **each day**. Books, magazines, newspapers, etc. are all good sources. If possible, read the same material and discuss the concepts and ideas or plot and characters with your child. Please don't forget about the Public Library Summer Programs for students. **Opportunities for writing** might be journal writing, letters to relatives, and book or movie reviews (I'd love to have some for my bulletin boards in August.) **Discuss ideas** with your child whenever possible to develop speaking skills. Going on trips, doing chores, watching the news, running errands, caring for a pet, doing handcrafts, and playing board games can all be good opportunities to **model conversation skills and higher-level thinking skills**. Limit the video games and TV and **encourage personal interaction** with other kids instead. **Have fun!**

Finally, the summer months are a great time to get your child involved in **community service projects**. Research has shown that children who get out and help others are much **less likely** to use illegal drugs, smoke, or use alcohol. Nursing homes, animal shelters, religious organizations, parks and recreation, and local neighborhood organizations will often allow and encourage middle school students to help out. This teaches children **responsibility and problem-solving** and keeps them from being too self-centered. To truly build character, children must reach out to help others and **discover the joy** that this brings.



6th Grade Penguins

This school year has been enjoyable and productive for teachers and students on the Penguin hall. Thank you to all the students for showing exceptional citizenship as a group in the halls and classrooms. You have done your work with pride and a positive attitude and you have been a joy to your teachers. Thank you to the parents of Penguin students for the countless ways you have supported the teachers and helped the students experience success in middle school. Ms. Lange, Ms. Keener, Mrs. Hees, Mrs. Fuller, and Ms. Harbin wish everyone a happy and safe summer!

The Penguins have continued to actively learn until the last day of school. In **Social Studies**, the last unit has been Global Interactions. Students have learned about the European Union and Asia with an emphasis on trade throughout the Pacific Rim. The students have developed an awareness this year of the world outside of the United States, and have learned about cultures, types of governments, economies, and human rights, and key issues in the world today.

In **Math** our year wound down with our unit, "Stretching and Shrinking". This unit explored similar figures, ratios, and scale factor. Students created and manipulated the Wump family, and at the end of the unit, we enlarged a comic strip scene. The red Connected Math and blue TAKS workbooks should be coming home, so be on the lookout. There are still lots of extra pages that students can complete during the summer to maintain and extend their Math skills over the summer! All 6th grade Math students will take a Spring Semester Exam during exams week (the last week of school). The Penguin Math students have done an outstanding job this year. Ms. Keener is proud of each student's accomplishments and hopes that all her students will continue to grow and be successful next year.

As we wrapped up the year in **Science**, we travelled through space! Our focus was on Newton's laws, the relationship between force & motion, how limiting factors affect space travel, characteristics of planets and space exploration. For our culminating project, each student put their knowledge and skills to the test by building their own rocket to launch!

Language Arts classes finished up the year with a literature-based unit entitled *Imagining Other Worlds*. In this unit, students focused on the genre of historical fiction via book clubs and self-selected historical fiction novels. In each book club meeting, Penguins engaged in discus-

sions which include the effects of setting, making connections, vocabulary acquisition, characterization, and theme. We ended this unit with a brief study of science fiction. These enduring skills will make a good foundation for our Penguins in their appreciation of good literature throughout their lives.

6th Grade Sea Otters



The **Social Studies** classes wound down the year with a look at 20th Century Europe and Global Interactions. Students took a brief look at World War I and II and examined the influence of the UN and EU in today's society. Asia was also highlighted in the final unit with an emphasis on trade throughout the Pacific Rim. We hope our whirlwind tour around the globe has been exciting and enlightening!

In **Language Arts**, the Sea Otters read self-selected books in book clubs where small groups of students gathered together to discuss a piece of literature in depth. The discussion was guided by students' responses to what they read. You may have heard talk about events and characters in the book, the author's craft, or personal experiences related to the story. Students reshape and add onto their understanding as they construct meaning with other readers. Finally, book clubs guide students to deeper understanding of what they read through structured discussion and extended written and artistic response. The **PACE** students wrapped up their Utopia Unit. Their final unit was about a dystopia, *Animal Farm* by George Orwell. We have enjoyed having your children in our classes this year. Please encourage your child to read over the summer!

7th Grade Texas History:

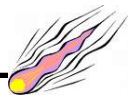

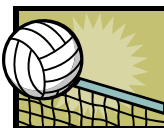

Mock Trial

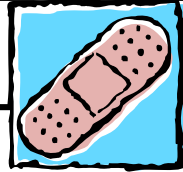

Nurse's Notes - by Judith Grace**The School Nurse's Wish List for 2010-2011**

As we finish the end of another productive school year at Renner, I am already looking forward to a fresh start in August. I hope that the suggestions below will hit home with many of you. Changes in our economy and the normal life changes of living with adolescents bring new challenges to parents. We must work together as a team to offer a safe and healthy learning experience for all our students. Here are some ways that you can help:

1. Your child's emergency card will be mailed to you over the summer. Fill out the emergency card completely, make changes in RED, and keep it up to date with phone numbers and emergency contacts. WRITE NEATLY. Write the names of every person you want to be authorized to be able to pick up your child. If you are notified that the emergency cards will be available on line this summer, please follow the directions carefully and be sure the information is correct.
2. Provide up-to-date information about your child's medical conditions and any medications they take. Your openness about your child's medical conditions will help me to make good judgments and determinations about his/her care. Please contact me directly about any changes in your child's health.
3. If you do not have medical insurance for your child, please consider applying for Texas CHIP. I have applications and other resources for free and reduced-cost insurance, medical and dental care, eye exams and glasses, medications, and immunizations. All requests will be handled confidentially.
4. Every time your child gets a new vaccine, ask for a copy for the school nurse. If your child needs vaccines, I can direct you to places where free and reduced-cost vaccines are available. I can also give you copies of your child's shot record.
5. Establish your family with a "medical home." Choose a provider and stick with them so that your child can get consistent care.
6. Get to know your pharmacist. If your child is having mild symptoms such as with a cold or allergy, your pharmacist can recommend medications for your child. A child with a cold may not be able to focus if their symptoms are persistent. They need medication or they need to stay home.

7. **PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE** keep them home when they are sick. This is not your child's decision. It is the parents' decision. While we really do want students to have good attendance, in 2009 we experienced three flu seasons – unprecedented in my 26-year career. By the time the fall outbreak hit us, we were well informed about managing the spread of the flu. Social distancing – keeping out of the public when ill, and flu shots certainly kept us from having a winter 2010 outbreak. Let's keep up the good work.

8. Please read completely and follow the directions that are given to you about handling medical procedures, medications, and readmission to school after illness. The PISD website offers some information and forms at <http://pisd.edu/parents/health/index.shtml> or call the nurse to be sure.

9. If your child has asthma, seizures, severe allergy, or diabetes, please have the Action Plan completed by the doctor before school starts each year. Action Plans are sent home with students at the end of the school year and are available on the website listed above.

10. Please do not ask your child to violate school policies by carrying medications to school. Students may only carry rescue medication for serious medical emergencies. Even then, proper authorizations must be obtained from the physician.

11. Student use of cell phones during the school day is prohibited. Encourage your child to be seen in the health office if they are ill or injured. Even though I have limited resources, many student complaints can be managed with simple measures. If your child calls or texts you, please ask them to go to the health office for an assessment. A call from you to let me know what is going on is appreciated.

12. PISD policy permits the school nurse to administer only those over-the-counter medications that are provided by the parent for a specific child. The medication must be in the original container, and a signed authorization form must be provided to the nurse. With this in mind, try to plan ahead if your child is subject to frequent headaches, orthodontic pain, cramps or allergies. It is also good planning to have a small bottle of analgesic-type medication (acetaminophen, ibuprofen, naproxen) if you are not able to leave work to deliver medication during the school day.

13. We do not have any medications for congestion, allergies, diarrhea, cramps, coughing, sneezing, or pain. If your child is having symptoms at home in the morning, it is not likely that they will just get better.

Try to address the problem before they come to school, and do everything you can to get them to eat breakfast.

14. Understand my limitations. We use peppermint candy to ease sore throats, coughing, and a variety of tummy troubles. We use salt-water gargle as a relief for sore throats as well. We have antibiotic ointment for wounds but limited resources for bandaging. Please do not expect your child to get regular dressing changes at school. As always, the nurse does not have a crystal ball, x-ray vision, or tooth fairy wings.

15. Injuries and illness that take place outside of school hours should be evaluated by your personal medical provider. If you question whether or not something is serious enough to require a doctor visit, it probably does. (See also x-ray vision above.)

A Final Word

If your 8th grader is due for a 10 year DPT booster shot in June, July or August, you will have already received notification. This documentation **MUST** be on file or your child will not be able to pick up his or her schedule in August. You may bring the shot record to Schedule Pick-Up if you like or mail it to Shepton over the summer. Keep a copy for yourself.

Immunizations Required for Entry to Grade 7:

- **TDaP (within the last 5 years)**
- **Meningitis**
- **Varicella #2 (unless student had chicken pox)**

**DO NOT WAIT UNTIL AUGUST TO COMPLETE THESE.
Immunizations must be on file in order for your student to
pick up his/her schedule and start school on the first day.**

**Many students have completed these immunizations,
but they are not on file with the nurse.
Contact your physician ASAP.**
